### **Parish Church Notes**

I can hardly believe that I am already writing for the summer edition of the magazine — hopefully this year we will have a summer!

By the time you read this it will be June or very nearly so. The first Sunday in June we keep as the feast of Corpus Christi (literally the 'Body of Christ'). It's a feast that actually falls on the Thursday after Trinity Sunday and because all those things are determined by the date of Easter it's a feast that moves about a bit! The actual date this year is 30th May but we shall, as I said, keep it on Sunday 2 June.

It is a feast in which we give thanks for the gift of the Eucharist (also called the Communion Service, Holy Communion or the Mass). This is the very heart of our worship when we receive the bread and wine which have been consecrated (set apart) in the Eucharist to be the Body and Blood of Christ. Although many theologians in the past have tried to explain what happens, it is one of those mysteries of the faith — something which is beyond the grasp of human imagination and understanding. It is something we accept by faith as part of the teaching of the Church as given to us by Christ and His Apostles. But it is the way through which we come to share intimately in the life of Christ; it is the pinnacle of Christian worship.

Moving on into July the Sunday School children will be having their end-of-term service on Sunday 7<sup>th</sup>, when they will be taking an active part in the Eucharist. They will meet again for the last time before the summer break on 21st July but will return in September. Children are welcome from around the age of four years, so, if you are interested, please get in touch with Helen Norman (01837 83719).

We shall be having our Church Fete at 2.30pm on Saturday 13<sup>th</sup> July in the Community Centre with Tea in the Village Hall. Tickets will be available before then for the traditional Duck Draw and other prizes. There will also be a Quiz in the Village Hall in the evening — look out for details and start organising your team!

The next day, Sunday 14th July at 3.00pm, we will be holding the usual Fair Sunday service in Church with 'eggs and flowers'. What form the Fair takes this year will be a little different but we will still be starting the week with the Fair Sunday service — this year perhaps we ought to say some special prayers for dry (or at least reasonable) weather! As always, there will be special flowers on display in Church for Fair Sunday and on the Tuesday of Fair Week there is a coffee and cake morning being planned for you to enjoy the flowers at your leisure — look out for details.

### **Community Centre Restoration Project**

Not a great deal of progress to report of late. The Jerryatric Builders have been on other duties. One third is now confined to barracks and very light duties; the second third has had duties overseas, whilst the final third has been away at work at Athelney and Somerton tunnel, trying to keep the trains running safely.

The vestibule by the toilets has been repainted. Well, it has had a first coat applied, with a further coat to be added in due course. Some additional work has been carried out around the windows in the kitchen.

Hopefully, work will restart shortly. The Secondary Glazing in the small hall has drawn much favourable comment

### LUNCH CLUB

The originally named Lunch Club has now been operating very successfully for four years with a remarkable team of volunteers cooking high-quality meals and providing service to our customers. The project was set up on receipt of a grant from the Esmée Fairbairn Trust that allowed us to purchase table linen, crockery and cutlery especially for the occasion.

The aim was to provide an opportunity for local people to enjoy a substantial meal in pleasant, convivial surroundings on a monthly basis throughout the Autumn and Winter months. Although we have some clients who have regularly supported the venture, there are others who only occasionally buy a ticket and all are made to feel most welcome. There was never an intention to make a profit but, in fact, a regular sum of £100+ has been passed to the Treasurer of the Community Centre on each occasion. We sincerely thank all who have supported us.

The Committee has decided that the 'Club' element in the name may suggest to some that this is an exclusive body, and so it will be re-named **COMMUNITY LUNCHES** for the start of the next season. The Committee also decided to set the dates in advance, and they are to be the **first Tuesday in the months Oct, Nov, Dec 2013; Feb, Mar, Apr 2014.** As usual tickets will be available before each date and will be limited to 24 persons.

To celebrate the continuing success of the Lunches, the Committee has decided to arrange a Special Lunch on 16<sup>th</sup> July, that is the Tuesday of Fair Week, and we are delighted to announce that the recently formed Bondleigh Barn Band, a local group of enthusiastic amateur musicians will be providing entertainment at the start of the meal. This is likely to take the form of a buffet so that more people can be accommodated, but the standard of cuisine and service will be as high as ever!

More details will be available on posters in the village and in the Fair Week programme.

### WINKLEIGH METHODIST CHURCH

During most of February and March, the congregation at Winkleigh Chapel met in the Community Centre. This was to give our builder space to tackle phase one of the refurbishment of the buildings — the interior of the chapel itself.

The work carried out included the removal of most of the pews, a tremendous amount of preparation and re-plastering, the introduction of numerous electrical sockets around the walls of the chapel, the levelling of the floor, and finally decoration. On the Wednesday during Holy Week the new carpet was laid and the new chairs were delivered on Maundy Thursday morning. A work-party set to on the afternoon of Good Friday to do the final clean and layout of the Chapel, and so the refurbished chapel was ready for a double celebration on Easter Sunday morning - the resurrection of both the Lord Himself, and of the chapel.

Future phases currently planned for the buildings in Winkleigh include roof repairs, and the development of both schoolroom areas.



The refurbishment of the Chapel means that most of our activities can now take place within the building itself, including Messy Church. Following on from the Messy Church Service on 14th May (Birthdays/Pentecost), our next one will be on 9th July (Calming the Storm); plus a proposed Messy Church walk and cream tea (3pm on Sunday 9th June). It is hoped that a Holiday Club will once again be arranged in the village sometime during August.

The Concert arranged by the Methodist Church on the Monday of Fair Week (July 15th) will feature the "Hatherleigh Gospel Choir".

The Oasis Coffee Shop continues to open on Mondays from 10am–1.30pm serving teas, coffees and lunches. The premises are also the proposed venue for the Memory Café which takes place on the first Tuesday of each month.

The main, unintended, highlights for the children were, of course, the straw bales, and many exhausted mini scarecrows wended their way homewards leaving a moulting trail of hay behind! Sadly, all of last year's Fair Committee decided to stand down, probably due to exhaustion, having toiled on many exceptional Fairs for quite a few years. We would love to have many more people volunteering, not necessarily in a major way, but to give a few hours of their time and the input of new ideas.

Congratulations must be given to the outgoing committee for imagination, dedication and sheer hard work, and although this year's festivities may not be on quite the same scale, we hope that with your support we can have another memorable event.

#### **PLANNING**

We are now in the process of being consulted on the next Local Plan. The Planning Departments of Torridge District Council and North Devon District Council have partially amalgamated in efforts to cut costs and hopefully, while pooling resources, to select mutual good practice and expertise from each other.

We have responded to and questioned Parts 1 and 2 and are awaiting a response from T.D.C. We have just received Part 3 which is extremely pertinent to our village as it deals with the distribution of housing in rural areas in which we are classed as a Local Centre. A few weeks ago we had as our speaker Ian Rowlands, a T.D.C. Planning Officer, who addressed our queries on Part 3 which looks at Winkleigh as a settlement and as an area for the potential development of 54 new houses.

The Government seems to be dictating to each District how much development there should be within a timeframe of 2011-31 and have given a ballpark figure of 2,200 new rural sites to be found within this time. The principle in our area seems to be that there should be a concentration around large

conurbations such as Barnstaple and Bideford and much less in rural areas. This may mean that, after any available infill is used, we may have to adjust our development boundaries accordingly, bearing in mind that over 80% of our residents in response to our last Local Plan did not want any more large estates but favoured affordable social housing.

Hopefully greater thought and effort will be given to local materials and design in the proposed housing and aspiration to a green agenda and general use of renewables. The quota of 54 houses, i.e. 10% of existing households, is not written in tablets of stone but we would need a robust justification for declining this amount of development.

W.P.C. are under a tight deadline to submit our response to T.D.C. by 1st June and feedback from residents would be greatly appreciated bearing in mind that our decisions will inform development in Winkleigh for the next 18 years.

#### HIGHWAYS AND TRAFFIC

Although we have been having an almost continuous dialogue with Andy Boyd-our County Councillor - on the problems with the "rat-run" from Zuki's past the school over a rather epic period of nine years, other highway problems seem to have superseded these. POTHOLES! I'm sure nobody could have missed the cautionary tales on the local news of the depredations of our recent ghastly weather — costing millions of pounds in repairs. There have been many comments from residents on the state of the High Street and the Square which have been passed on to highways. Please, if you have noticed other necessary road repair areas around the village, let W.P.C. know so that we can present a comprehensive list to D.C.C. You can be sure that we will continue pestering!

#### GRANTS

Every year we advertise for grant applications in public noticeboards and *Distinctly Winkleigh* between May and July. Application forms can be obtained from W.P.C. and need to be returned by September so that the agreed funding can be included in the P.C.'s precept in November. The following grants were given last year -2012-2013

WINKLEIGH FAIR - £300 (£97.01 returned as unspent by the last committee) PRE-SCHOOL - £100 C.A.B. - £100 OKEHAMPTON RING AND RIDE - £100

2013—2014 (so far) ALL SAINTS CHURCH - £200 METHODIST CHAPEL - £200

#### FINANCE

Although we have frozen the Parish Precept at £13,500 for the past two years, due to increasing costs it has to be increased slightly this year to £14.577. This amounts to only £1.50 per household per annum. The accounts of the P.C. can be subject to scrutiny on request once they have been audited and adopted.

#### T.A.P. FUND

This new fund has been established by T.D.C. and D.C.C. to develop collaborative working between parishes and distributes £1.10 per elector. Catherine Knight has been leading this initiative and we have agreed to join with Ashreigney to purchase a defibrillator and training for volunteers. Anyone who would like to volunteer for this vital role please contact the P.C.

#### COMMUNITY PLAN

Following a successful parish Open Day last September, the Community-Led Plan Group are updating the 2005 Parish Plan with a 10 year vision for Winkleigh. A draft is envisaged by the end of this year, with the final plan being published around Spring/Summer 2014. As well as gathering feedback from local authorities and groups, a Questionnaire to all households in the parish will be delivered with *Distinctly Winkleigh* in May to help provide this vision. Community views on housing and business development, the environment, community, youth, services and facilities, will help us target action or funding where most needed in future. Please complete and return the Questionnaire when you receive it---your views are important!

### Wallingbrook Health Group - Patient Participation Group (PPG)

There have been significant changes within the NHS. and rural healthcare is under increasing pressure. However, Winkleigh PPG. meet with Wallingbrook on a monthly basis to receive updates, to provide patient feedback and lobby for improved services for the community. Despite the inadequate surgery and parking facilities at Winkleigh, transport difficulties, appointment availability and the telephone system, healthcare provision is generally very good. Winkleigh PPG. have also negotiated a Nurse Practitioner session from 8.30-10.30 and a G.P. session from 2.00-6.00 on Wednesday afternoons. We have also installed a Suggestion Box in the waiting room, so please use it! If you would like to join Winkleigh P.P.G. contact **Eve Willis** on **01769 580295**.

#### CODE OF CONDUCT

All Parish Councils are now obliged to adopt a Code of Conduct and we have adopted the particular one recommended by the National Association of Local Councils. At the start of each P.C. meeting we publicly disclose any personal, pecuniary or prejudicial interest in any of the following agenda items and sign a register to this effect. This works both ways as a protection for the general public and also as an insurance of the integrity of our councillors.

### WINKLEIGH PRIMARY SCHOOL – Summer 2013


We are now into the swing of the summer term and the children have all come back with plenty of enthusiasm for learning.

### **District Councillor's Report**

#### Ready for Ageing?

Recently, the House of Lords published a report, *Ready for Ageing?*, which stated that Britain was "woefully underprepared" to cope with the expected rapid increase in the number of older people in the population. For anyone interested in the future of public services and the welfare state – looking forward from the short-term debate about austerity – it is essential reading. It is particularly relevant to Winkleigh as our community has a far higher older people profile than the national average.

The post-war welfare state was constructed with the assumption of full employment followed by a brief retirement. Now we are moving to a society where the population is ageing rapidly and where for an increasing number a third of life will consist of retirement. Key projections about ageing include –

- Over 50% more people aged 65 and over in England in the next twenty years;
- Over double the number of over 85s in the next twenty years; and
- Over 80% more people with dementia.

Yet "no government so far has had a vision and coherent strategy" as services, pensions and social care continue broadly to be moulded by an outdated 1950s model.

The report warns of "a series of miserable crises" if the government doesn't develop a more holistic approach with co-ordinated action on all fronts – physical, mental, financial and practical. "The current healthcare system is not delivering good enough healthcare for older people and is inefficient." Britain is obsessed with hospitals, spending billions on expertise and equipment when what is required is much greater effort to keep us out of hospital.

Other points of interest in the report -

- "It does not seem fair to expect today's younger taxpayers especially those not born to better-off parents – to pay more for the increased costs of an older society while asset-rich older people (and their children) are protected. For this reason too, an effective equity release market to unlock the housing assets held by older people is important.";
- "Government, pensions industry and employers must tackle the lack of certainty in
  defined contribution pensions and address their serious defects to make it clearer
  what people can expect to get from their pensions as a result of the savings they
  make.":
- "Central and local government should work together with the third sector to increase volunteering especially by older people to support older people."; and
- "The government should set out its analysis of the issues and challenges, and their vision for public services in an ageing society, in a White Paper to be published well before the next general election."

We are now at a pivotal moment in the UK. Do we have an informed debate on how we might invest and restructure to build a vibrant society in which the generations are integrated and mutually supportive or will we continue to be obsessed with austerity and cutting departmental budgets, which will ensure that our society will wither on the ageing vine?

### **ACE Archaeology Club**

ACE has been really busy at Moistown over the past few months, we have completed the earthwork survey and held another geophysics session (all before the Bluebells had grown too much!). This time as well as using Earth Resistance, we carried out a Magnetometry survey of the whole site plus a bit of the field to the east, the results of which can be seen at the Old Technology and Archaeology Festival on the 20th July.

Plans are well under way for our excavation at Moistown in September, we will be having an open day, so do come and see what we have found. There will be information about this in the next issue of *Distinctly Winkleigh*.

In June ACE is off to the other side of Dartmoor, for what is probably our last visit to the tin workings at Crownhill Down, where Dr Sandy Gerrard will be treating us to a guided tour of the excavations there. Soon the site will be used for the spoil from a nearby tungsten mine, all of the archaeology there will be lost forever, but at least it has been thoroughly recorded before its destruction.


