Community Centre Notes

Attempts are now in hand to try to make the centre a little warmer for the winter season. Observant hall users will have already noticed that replacement ceiling tiles have been fitted to replace all of the discoloured ones. That task now been completed, hopefully we have tackled the source of water ingress as well – time will tell.

Various specialists have assessed the windows in the main hall. Quotes have been obtained and an order has now been placed. Panes of glass have been ordered to replace various areas where Perspex has been fitted over the years, the Perspex has now become opaque and looks awful, a number of cracked panes will be replaced as part of the same job. New secondary glazing has also been ordered. This will be fitted to the mullions and will be made of safety glass inside a strong frame. Some will be sliding units to allow for ventilation, whilst others will be in solid pieces. This work will be starting in the New Year. This allows time to carry out remedial work to the existing window frames. Some need to have numerous paint layers removed in order to allow the opening windows to close properly.

Once these tasks have been completed, a further review of heating will take place – there is no point in putting in better heating if the heat goes straight out of the windows! Meanwhile if users have to open the windows, please ensure that they are closed properly after the session. Can I please also put out a call for assistance on Monday mornings to assist carrying out the preparation work.

I shall end these notes with a reminder that details of all our services can be found in the *Parish Bulletin*. This can be found, free of charge, at the back of the Church and in the Post Office. But before I get to the end there is something else in the *Parish Bulletin* that I'd like to draw your attention to. You may not have noticed it but on the inside of the front cover is a section entitled 'Helpful Information'. It tells you there what to do if you are thinking of getting married or wanting to have your baby baptised. It also tells you that I am available to visit the sick, wherever possible, at home or in hospital regardless of whether they go to Church or not. Obviously I can only do this if the person concerned would like me to and if someone tells me that they are sick. (Some people think I am telepathic and will know without being told — sadly this is not the case). Of course, some people don't want to see a priest or, if they belong to another Church their own priest or minister would normally visit.

The *Parish Bulletin* will also tell you that those who cannot attend Church anymore because they are housebound or are temporarily unable to get out because of sickness can receive Holy Communion in their own homes or in hospital. Anointing with holy oil is also available for the sick and for the dying. All these things are part of the traditional ministry of the Church and are available on request — so please don't be afraid to ask.

In the December *Parish Bulletin* will be some extra 'Helpful Information' namely the times of our Christmas Services and other events some of which I'm including here.

Friday 12th at 2.00 p.m. Winkleigh School will he having their Christmas service in Church and on Saturday 20th at 7.30 p.m. there will be the traditional Christmas Concert (including Carols for you to sing) by the Winkleigh Singers.

Christmas Eve and Christmas Day services are as follows.

Christmas Eve 5.00 p.m. Crib Service with a real donkey and starting

with candlelight

11.45 p.m. Midnight Mass

Christmas Day 9.30 a.m. Christmas Eucharist

All of these services will of course include traditional Christmas Carols. You are welcome at any or all of these celebrations and we look forward to sharing with you in celebrating the birth of Jesus Christ — which is what Christmas is all about.

This time last year I was able to report that we were still in existence, still doing some useful things, but could not pretend to have made a great leap forward. This year we have some very real progress. This is largely due to the efforts of Alan Mulcahy and Distinctly Winkleigh in raising sufficient revenue, not only to pay for the magazine but have a bit left over for other things.

First the website is now running as we would wish. This has taken time, not least because everyone we asked to fix it immediately "left the planet". This time the Commonwealth has come to our aid and we can now even print the Winkleigh timetable, as well as having it on line. A website is, of course, only as good as the information that people put into it, and those people include you. We hear complaints of events clashing with each other, but unless those events are flagged up on the website then clashes will continue. The Winkleigh Calendar for 2015 is already in the shops and selling well. The photographs are superb, and all thanks to Alan Jacobs and Peter Monkcom for putting it together, and all the other photographers. I particularly like the cow and the laundry. We listened to those who did not want all the local dates in big letters because you send calendars to the family in far-flung parts, but the dates are still there inside the front cover. Meanwhile, please remember that we shall need another set of photos next year which are relevant to the area and to the season.

The Directory is now in every house in the parish, and thanks to Margaret Miller and Alan Mulcahy for that. Of course, it is out of date before it is even published That is the nature of these things, but we keep the website updated with new and changed details, provided we are told of them.

Next time you are at the Sports Hall and it isn't raining, take a look round the back. The Green Group have been busy planting, and the raised area which was the site of the spoil from the building of the Hall, has now got a copse growing on it, fenced off from livestock. There is a long way to go, and plenty to do, and those of you who want to do something that does not involve slaving over a computer, please contact Philippa Lausen, Catherine Knight or Kim Melhuish to offer your services.

The Winkleigh Community Plan expresses concern about our three community buildings, and the apparent lack of coordination between them, and suggested that the Winkleigh Society might address this. Before the Plan is even printed, we can report real movement in that area, and Alan Jacobs has chaired several meetings between the chairs of the Village Hall, the Community Centre and the Sports Hall, which has already resulted in a new Information board for all three venues on the side of the Post Office. There are even rumours of joint events in the future.

And now for something new. We are starting to put together a leaflet both for visitors and locals directing people to local products. Although we clearly have visitors in mind, I am sure there are many local people who don't know all our local food producers and craftspeople. At present this led by a small group of ten enterprises, including cider and wine makers, metalworkers, sausage producers, florists and we shall produce a simple leaflet to advertise both the products and the outlets. How far this can go in the future is up to the entrepreneurs themselves, but our immediate thanks go to Frank Ward of Gfive Design for offering to help design and produce. Any enquiries please to me on 01837 83362.

The latest bit of work is for a Newcomers' Pack. Apparently we can easily get to know who is moving into the village and we hope it will not be a mammoth task to put through the door some of the basics of Winkleigh life, not least a directory, calendar and lists of councillors and events.

But finally a plea. Our committee members appear to be growing older each year. We do need new people, either on the committee or simply being prepared to assist. Please contact any member of the committee, and if you arrive not only offering some time but also a new project, then you will be even more welcome. Winkleigh Society exists to be an enabling organisation. If you want to do something for village communal life, we exist to help.

Plastic Recycling

Thank you to all those who have continued to support this venture. In the last 6 months, PWS has made 20 collections and has taken away over 1 tonne of plastics, textiles and cardboard, much of which might otherwise have ended up in landfill sites. PWS has generally been happy with the items left at the site, but has reminded us that all items must be **clean** and any textiles must be **re-wearable/reusable**. There have been recent instances where soiled items have been left. **This sort of article is totally unacceptable**. PWS may withdraw the textile bin should unacceptable items continue to be left.

Please do not leave drinks cartons, as they are made of a mixture of materials and cannot be mixed in with the plastics. These cartons can all be recycled at the main council recycling centres. Dog Waste: Winkleigh Parish Council has received several complaints about dog fouling, as a result of irresponsible dog owners not picking up after their dogs. This is UNACCEPTABLE, ANTI-SOCIAL and ILLEGAL. There are numerous bins funded out of your Council Tax — located around the parish. Posters are being put up to remind 'forgetful' dog-owners of their responsibility and to alert the community that this can be reported to the Dog Warden anonymously.



The Parish Council takes this issue VERY SERIOUSLY and urges those seeing offenders, to contact the HOTLINE to report the offence. WPC can also advise TDC of any areas of particular concern and request an Enforcement Officer visit; they can issue £75 ON-THE-SPOT FINES. So, watch out and pick up after your dog – someone may be watching and report you!

To report an offence call the TDC HOTLINE on 01237 428810. Alternatively, forms are available from the Village Stores.

AED/Defibrillator: Having secured funding from TDC via the Town and Parish Grant Scheme in partnership with Ashreigney PC, and following a public training event held on 12th June, WPC are pleased to announce an AED (automated external defibrillator) is

now fully installed and operational.



The device is located beside the Kings Arms, Parish Notice Board and red 'phone box in the Square. The AED is for use when someone suffers a heart attack; there are instructions inside, so even if you have never used one before, by following the guidelines, you could potentially help save someone's life. Cllrs Ware and Bowers act as Co-ordinators, ensuring the device is kept maintained.

AN EXAMPLE FOR ALL

Faith, hope and charity abound at FIONA'S FARM SHOP, Winkleigh in Mid Devon (take the road towards Torrington and fork right where signposted for Hollocombe) which is perhaps not surprising as she is the leading light in the Methodist community of Winkleigh. John Wesley would be proud of her and her customers are enthusiastic about the place she founded with her family at age 25, some ten years ago, providing coffee, lunch and tea with home produced items to take away. Fiona never misses the invitation to go the extra mile and the shop provides comfortable seating for about 12 or so. The farm shop shines like a beacon in a wilderness for travellers and locals alike. An extended rail has now been provided to help the halt and the lame from car park to shop.

In the centre of the village stands THE SHOP AT THE END OF THE UNIVERSE (a.k.a. the Bakery Stores) where lively and ever helpful girls wait to serve you. Couple this with the sub post office where the post mistress and her staff of one are ready to conduct post office business on the pavement come rain or shine (like the village shop) for anyone finding difficulty in making it into the post office and you may understand why this is such a happy and contented village. It may also explain why houses here and hereabouts are only rarely on the market. Men, women and children of Winkleigh are only too ready to help others. I have often been approached by children and asked 'Can I help you Sir?'

Why is there so much discontent and crime in wealthier and allegedly more advanced areas of England? Very recently I met two girls in Winkleigh in their mid-twenties, one of whom had never visited London and had no wish to do so whilst the other had never been on a train. Neither felt deprived, nor were they. One feels that John Wesley would be proud of the example which Fiona and mid Devon generally offer. This is Christianity in action.

How does one explain this phenomenon? Its origins are modest aspiration, concern for others and accepting things as they are rather than the stark ambition for illusory so-called 'improvements'. Fiona will continue to be inspired by Faith, Hope and Charity in 2015.

Perhaps the United Nations should be invited to send a delegation to Winkleigh to investigate how things are done there and thereabouts with a view to employing the knowledge gained to promote world peace and harmony? Such knowledge and its implementation is needed today as never before.

"D'yuh think I could borrow a hook mistah" He gave me a winning, snottynosed smile, then added "and a few weights?"


I nodded to my tackle box, "Help yourself. What's the fishing like?"

"Oh, that's a shiddie mate. Mind them spines they're poison."



I disengaged the hook carefully and nudged the fish back over the edge of the jetty with the edge of my boot, re-baited and settled down again. A few minutes later I got another bite and reeled in a small flattish fish. It grunted as I removed the hook. "What's this?" I enquired of a small boy who had just asked if he could borrow my knife to cut up some of my bait.

"Oh, yeah, that's a shiddie mate."

I found this a bit confusing. Apart from their size my catches looked quite dissimilar. This one, even to my untrained eye, was surely a completely different species from the last one. In fact I thought the first one might have been a puffer fish.

I said,"So this is a shiddie?" to the knife borrowing boy.

"Yup. That's a shiddie." He confirmed.

"So what was the fish I caught just now? The small spiny one?" Yup. Shiddie mate. Same as this 'n"

"So they're both called shiddies then?" I waited for his nod. "Why's that then?"

He looked up from his task of dissecting my bait, (I assumed he was shortly going to ask if he could borrow some,) "They're called shiddies", he explained patiently, "Cus they taste like shid."

Many Winkleigh residents rely upon Liquid Petroleum Gas (LPG) for their domestic energy needs. It's expensive and, at times, supplies can be problematic.

Following a 2009 exposé of local pricing differences on the BBC TV Programme 'Don't Get Done, Get Dom,' a group of residents from the developments at Kings Meadow and Westcots, ably led by Janet Hobbs, has been negotiating community prices for LPG with Flogas Britain Ltd. Janet has now passed on the task (Many thanks, Janet!) to a new group comprising Collin Gibson, Luke Goddard and Robin Coombes.

Following a recent meeting with the Regional Sales Manager of *Flogas*, a new two year price agreement has been negotiated. Effective **January 1, 2015**, the price of LPG will be **41.0 pence per litre**, plus VAT, (a reduction of 2.0 pence per litre!) fixed for twelve (12) months. Any price increase in the second 12 months will not exceed 2.5 pence plus VAT in any six (6) month period. There's also a clause allowing for renegotiation after 12 months if market prices are clearly trending down. The daily standing charge remains the same.

Residents currently using *Flogas* as their supplier – it appears to be over 160 local households – should receive new contracts from them in the near future. Other area residents who use bulk LPG for domestic energy can also benefit from the agreement. They should contact *Flogas* direct.

THE GREAT WAR

Somewhere in Flanders, October 5th 1917.

My dear friends,

The Vicar has asked me to write you a few lines which it gives me great happiness to do, for home and friends and old associations never seem so dear as when one is far away in the turmoil of war.

I am with the Artillery and will try and give you a rough idea of the sort of work one has out here. I have a number of batteries to look after, which may vary from a dozen upwards, according to circumstances.

The actual guns are in forward positions and the "rest billets" some little way behind them, the men working in shifts.



Services are usually arranged in rest billets when the men are off duty, and, of course, one visits them in their gun positions as well. The services out here are in strange contrast to those you are accustomed to. They have to be held in the open air usually, for there is no building to have them in, nothing but-dug outs or tiny huts, for you must bear in mind that the actual battle area does not only consist of the front trenches but extends several miles behind the lines, in fact as far back as the Hun shells can reach. And in this area a perpetual artillery duel is going on day and night, so all buildings are in ruins and nearly everyone lives in a dugout. So the services have to be of a "rough and ready" sort. Thirty or forty men as a rule make up a "congregation" of a battery, and they stand around in a semi circle, and the old familiar hymns are sung unaccompanied, except by the constant boom of the guns. After the general service one has a Celebration of the Holy Communion if possible. I had one the other day, when the Altar was a tin box lying in a field, and the men knelt in an old shell hole. Yet these services have a wonderful reality and earnestness that is beautiful, and those who live day and night in the shadow of death feel their need of God in a way they cannot or do not when at home. I know that many of you are remembering me and my comrades in your prayers; and, believe me, we value them enormously and they lift us through as nothing else can.

With affectionate remembrances to all my friends in Winkleigh.

District Councillor's Report

Over the past four years I have written in 'Distinctly Winkleigh ' and other media about how central government's "austerity" policies have been impacting local authorities.

You may have seen a piece in the North Devon Journal in October ("TDC decides against option to cut 72 jobs") accompanied by a picture of Torridge District Council staff lobbying outside Bideford Town Hall, before an extraordinary meeting of the Full Council. The events leading up to this meeting were quite surreal and I can assure you that I am not making it up!

In the spring it was decided to appoint consultants (iESE) to help TDC develop new ways of working, which are needed particularly due to continual central government cut-backs (£2.2 million from now to 2017). Initially everything went well and the consultants came up with some interesting ideas to enable joined-up responses to customers and to work with other councils. We were also introduced to how West Devon and South Hams were restructuring with many services being combined and how Eastbourne Borough Council had been transformed from a council in special measures.

At the end of August the pace began to quicken and the consultants presented a plan to make around £1.2 million savings by new ways of working and working closer with West Devon and South Hams (WDSH). Based mainly on power point presentations Communities and Resources Committee and Overview and Scrutiny Committee gave - at best - an amber light (I am not on either committee and was not there) stating words to the effect, "it sounds interesting show us more." The consultants and WDSH then went into overdrive producing a recommended option to merge TDC into a new model. At this point many of us woke up to what might be happening and asked for the complete model showing cost assumptions and how the model would impact reserves. Some TDC staff and councillors also did research on what had been happening with WDSH. In summary, we found -

- 1. The new model would cost TDC around £3.7 million, mainly in redundancies, pensions and IT investment;
- 2. Not only would TDC reserves be wiped out, but TDC would also have to borrow to make up the shortfall;
- 3. Minutes of West Devon committee meetings on West Devon's own website, show that West Devon councillors were being sold a restructuring model being in the main funded by TDC; and
- 4. WDSH had already set up an organisation based in Totnes (registered at Companies House as "Servaco") with a new Chief Executive and Company Secretary already appointed!!!

Thankfully common sense prevailed and every councillor (bar one, who abstained) voted not to join WDSH. Hopefully, we can now put this experience behind us and get on with developing our own "Transformation Programme". We all know that by local authorities more effectively working together services can be improved and savings made. For Torridge, in the medium term – possibly after the next election in May – I hope that more constructive work with North Devon District Council will develop to exploit synergies between the two councils and other organisations. Maybe we have all learnt something from our recent 'you cannot make it up' experience?

ACE Archaeology Club

We have had another good year although it didn't get off to a great start as we had to cancel a few days due the rather wet weather, remember that?



In March we sensibly did something indoors, we had a session on flint knapping, making tools from flints as people would have done in the Stone Age. We did this under the expert instruction of flint knapper Anthony Whitlock. See the picture of the rather good attempt of one of our members. Luckily there were very few injuries, sharp stuff flint!

While April was still little damp and chilly some of us ventured out to Fingle Mill on the Castle Drogo estate to have a look at the remains of the mill and try to work out what sort of mill it was and what buildings might have been standing before it was destroyed by fire in the 1890s. One of our members is doing some research on the mill for the National Trust and the visit was useful.





On the same day we also visited Cranbrook and Wooston Castles; Iron Age hill forts overlooking the Teign Valley.

August saw us walking on Kit Hill in Cornwall. For those who don't know it Kit Hill has a wealth of archaeology dating from the Bronze Age to recent times. It also has fabulous views.

In July we took part in the Council for British Archaeology festival - an annual event that runs for a fortnight in July. We do our bit under the auspices of the Festival of Archaeology and Old Technology at Pattiland Farm near Winkleigh.

The highlight of our year was The Dig. This was our second year excavating at Moistown near Winkleigh. It is the site of a possible medieval house. This year we continued to uncover a lovely cobbled floor and retrieved lots of pottery. The pottery has still to be dated but seems to cover a period from early medieval to Victorian.



These activities are just a sample of what we do. Next year we hope to do some more pottery-making, creating shields using willow, do some more work on a database of roundhouses on Dartmoor and we will again be taking part in the CBA Festival and digging for the third year at Moistown.

Friends of Winkleigh School

The efforts of the "Friends" group continue relentlessly now that School has entered into another academic year and Christmas is once again on the, not too distant, horizon. The last report mentioned the many attempts that have been made to organise a "Race Night" and the difficulties encountered in finding a suitable date. Well we got there! The night is booked for Saturday 29th November and posters are on display as I write, but I am reliably informed, that the event will have happened before you read this article!

The big evening of the year which took place at the Sports Centre on 8th November was of course "Fireworks Night" and once again I can report a hugely spectacular and well attended event, despite the weather. A well stocked bar, BBQ and tuck shop ensured that a sociable evening could be enjoyed by all when the display was finished. A big add-on that was particularly enjoyed by the younger attendees this year was the use of the "green" at the rear of the main building. The weather did relent enough for the full moon to show itself and provide enough light for natural "play" to be enjoyed by many in that area. I believe that the Winkleigh community in general will be pleased to be aware that the current committee at the Centre, many of whom are new in post, are currently working on plans for development of play facilities in this area. At the time of writing the finances for the evening have not been finalised.

The "Friends" A G M took place on 16th October at 8.00 pm in the School and although attendance numbers were disappointing some new supporters for the future were present. The Chair, Tim Rhodes, presented a summary of events from the last year and the Treasurer, Anna Bridgman, summarised accounts for the financial year. In the past year the School has benefitted to the tune of approximately £4,500 in donations from FOWS. This has given support to specific requests including ipads, laptops and the climbing wall. £200 per class went to support School trips. Events run during the year raised approximately £2,600 and the balance standing in the account at the close of the year is around £3,000.

At the meeting which followed the A G M mention was made of the 100 club, which has now entered a new year and doubled by joining up with the Pre-School which is now a part of the foundation unit in the primary set up. Year 6 pupils are planning to run a New Year disco as part of an enterprise business event management scheme and FOWS have suggested running a stall at this and other events. There was some discussion over the possibility of FOWS having a separate newsletter on perhaps another day in the week to give more publicity, and this will be taken up with School Admin. A quiz night in the New Year was suggested, to be discussed with Toni at the Kings Arms. 
