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Winkleigh's Three Remembrance Services - 2019

On **Saturday 9th November** the Winkleigh Airfield Memorial Remembrance Service was held at 10.45. Just before it started, the weather looked as if it would be a repeat of last year, so the 50 people present assembled in the adjacent large barn, courtesy of Tristan Johnson. The Service was led by Revd Helen Blaine with the roll-call of the fallen read out by Major Jonathan Juurlink (RCAF), who was accompanied by his wife Yoko, five year old son and two daughters. The wreaths were laid in the barn by Major Juurlink and the Chair of TDC as well as representatives from village organisations. The Last Post and Reveille were played by Carl Woodison, who also accompanied the hymns. Thank you Carl! When the service was over, as the rain had held off and the sun was shining briefly, the wreaths were carried outside to be laid round the memorial.

On **Sunday 10th November**, the Village Remembrance Service was held in the Parish Church with Revd Helen Blaine officiating. The congregation assembled at the War Memorial for the wreath-laying ceremony, again by representatives from village organisations. The names of the Fallen were read out by Major F R (Ron) Fletcher and the congregation then processed into the Church for the rest of the service. The Last Post and Reveille were played by Katrina Beer from the back of the Church. Thank you Katrina!



On **Monday 11th November** all the children from Winkleigh School with their teachers trooped up to the Church for a short service. Ten of the Year 6 pupils had each traced the lives of some of the WW1 casualties and read out their findings to the rest of the school, as well as relatives and friends. At about 10.50 am, the ten children and the adult congregation processed out to the War Memorial, where the children took their

places for the Service and one of them laid a wreath on behalf of Winkleigh School, before the silence was observed at 11 o'clock. Afterwards all the children and their teachers walked back to the school. The whole school should be congratulated for attending the service and behaving impeccably throughout.

In addition, businesses in the Parish displayed Poppy Appeal collection boxes to receive donations from customers and individual volunteers collected from homes.

Thanks to the generosity of all in the area, a grand total of £2,131.99, was raised for the Poppy Appeal to provide assistance to veterans and serving members of the armed forces and their families who are experiencing problems.

Winkleigh Parish Council Notice of Casual Vacancies

Notice is hereby given that 2 co-option vacancies have occurred among the members of the Parish Council. Any person willing to fill this vacancy should apply to the Clerk in writing or email.

Any person wishing to apply to become a member must meet at least one of the qualifications set out below in order to be eligible for co-option and must not be disqualified under Section 80 of the Local Government Act 1972.

- The applicant must be registered as a local government elector for the parish; or
- The applicant should, during the whole of the twelve months preceding the date of co-option, have occupied as owner or tenant, land or other premises in the parish; or
- The applicant's principal or only place of work during those twelve months has been in the parish; or
- Have during the whole of twelve months resided in the parish or within 3 miles of it.

PUBLIC elections cannot be held until the year 2023 but for the interim period the present sitting Councillors may co-opt to fill the vacancies.

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All Saints News

Being the incumbent of an ancient church has many joys and many challenges. It is wonderful to be able to continue to welcome people through our doors, as people have been welcomed for over 700 years.

As I walk through the graveyard and admire the stunning view, I am always comforted by the fact that despite a changing world, political trials and tribulations, All Saints has stood the test of time. As wars have raged, governments come and go and technology moves at a rapid pace, our church stands as a testament to faith of those who have gone before us. A place to bring the concerns of our lives and our world before God, a space to bring before God the events of our lives; births, marriages and deaths. Our church is a holy and peaceful space which speaks of the prayers and worship of the generations before us. You only have to wander around the gravestones to see not just a social history but the story of this village, of lives and faith. This is a wonderful context in which to minister, to play my small part in ensuring that faith and welcome remains alive.

Being the current incumbent however brings the challenge of ensuring that this beautiful building is still standing for future generations. It is not a burden I bear alone, and I am grateful for the members of the PCC and also the care, dedication, practical and financial support of many people, both past and present, all of which means All Saints is looking reasonably good for its age. Over Christmas we had a leaking roof and a flooded vestry, sharply reminding us that buildings age and bits fail! These issues have now been resolved but we need to continue to work hard to ensure our church continues to tell the story of this village for future generations and to be able to have a place of prayer and worship.

Our yearly expenses include the maintenance of graveyard, the day to day repairs and upkeep of the building, insurance and the cost of having a priest. (This is shared out amongst the other churches and subsidised by the Diocese of Exeter). This means that just to keep the church open and ready to have services, to be a place of prayer, of remembrance and celebration, it costs us around £90 a day and that is before any other repairs or bigger maintenance jobs. At the moment this cost is given by the generosity of the regular congregation, donations from services and the occasional bequest. We need the parish as a whole to help keep All Saints as a central part of village life. It is not the church of those who gather there each Sunday but is your church.

If you wish to donate, either as a one off or as a regular contribution, please speak to either myself or Collin Gibson, our Treasurer.

As we approach Lent and Easter there is much going on. Bishop Jackie Searle, the Bishop of Crediton will be at the Saturday Market on 7th March. Our Mothering Sunday service is at 9.30 am on 22nd March and is suitable for everyone.

We recognise that Mothering Sunday is a difficult time for many. From Sunday 15th March until Mothering Sunday there will be a memory tree in the Lady Chapel. You are invited to come into church at any time and tie on a ribbon (provided) in memory of a child, parent, relative, or to signify a sorrow or pain. During Holy Week, Easter and up until Pentecost the tree will evolve and be used in different ways as we journey to the cross and beyond. Look out for details of our Holy Week and Easter service and do come and join us.

Edward Funnell - Maker of the All Saints Church Clock

I am the Diocesan Clock Adviser for the Diocese of Chichester which covers all of Sussex. Most of Edward Funnell's clocks are located in East Sussex, in or near Brighton. The clock at All Saints Winkleigh was made by Edward Funnell of Brighton in 1872. Most of the other clocks Funnell made in Sussex I have seen, but I always wanted to visit Winkleigh to see the most westerly Funnel clock I have heard of. I'm not sure why there is a Funnell clock so far away from Brighton?



At All Saints there is a wooden plaque dated October 1932 which says that the clock was restored and Westminster Chimes added. Were Westminster Chimes added to the existing clock movement? I doubt it as it all looks to be made in 1872, so perhaps a previous striking-only clock movement was taken away and a second-hand clock movement bought that had Westminster Chimes. Someone at All Saints may

remember, or be able to look back in church records. If this is correct it would be interesting to know where the second-hand clock movement came from.

On 18th May 2019 I visited Winkleigh with Andy Burdon, a friend who is also interested in turret clocks, and we were very pleased to be shown the clock at All Saints by Tim Rhodes the Clock Keeper. We were not disappointed and spent some time examining it and taking many photos.

Edward Funnell was the eldest son of Charles Funnell, a Shoemaker, and Eleanor of 4 Boyce's Street, Brighthelmstone, now known as Brighton. He was baptized on 28th April 1822 so he was aged 50 when the All Saints clock was made. He is credited with making the smallest watch in the world at the time, for the 1851 Crystal Palace Great Exposition. It is said that Edward was a man of small stature. I was fortunate to buy what must be the smallest turret clock ever made which is about 12 inches in length;

could Edward have made this small turret clock also to show at the 1851 Exposition? More information about the Funnell family can be found online by searching for "Funnell's Wood" where there are photos of some of his clocks such as the Hannington's and my turret clock, and history of all Funnell's clocks worldwide.

New premises were acquired in Trafalgar Street, Brighton sometime between 1854 and 1856. Edward is said to have ceased business in 1878 and died aged 67 in the last quarter of 1889. Edward would have had men working for him to help make the clocks.

Edward made several clocks for churches in and around Brighton including one made in the same year as Winkleigh in 1872 for St John the Baptist Church in Hove. Other church clocks were made for: Hurstpierpoint, Newick, Chailey, St Mary at Chiddingfold among others. Also a clock for St Denys in Rotherfield in East Sussex. He also made the public clock for Hannington's Department Store in Brighton, now sadly closed, but its clock movement will be on show again in Brighton when is incorporated in a new development.

Apart from public clocks he also made house clocks, of which I have seen several. Edward's shop and workshop were taken over by another man, but one house clock I saw had painted on the dial: H. Kyzer, Late E. Funnell, East Street, Brighton.

Brighton at that time was a railway town with the facilities to make steam locomotives and everything else that is needed by a railway. Edward also designed a "Self-Acting Electro-Magnetic Clock Work Signal for Railway Purposes", with patent No 1767 of 15th July 1863.

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The Edward Funnell clock at All Saints Winkleigh is described as having a green-painted flat-bed frame which unusually is made in three parts closely joined as one bed, one each for the striking on the left, time-keeping in the middle and Westminster quarters on the right. Cast into the flat-bed and pendulum bob are the words: "E. Funnell 1872 Brighton" inside an oval. It has a "dead-beat" escapement. Now no longer hand-

wound, the time-keeping part has an automatic winder, the striking and Westminster Quarters trains have had "direct-drive" fitted to the "fly" arbors. This is not something that is approved of these days but I hope one day the auto-winder and direct-drives can be removed and more sympathetic automatic winding fitted instead. I would freely help with advice, guidance and with grant applications, should such a change be envisaged at some future time. The clock also has a long wooden rod and cast-iron bob pendulum. Two black-painted convex copper dials with gold-leaf Roman numerals are on the south and west sides of the church tower.

On the wood case which protects the clock movement are the winding instructions painted onto the wood as follows: "First, wind No. 1 immediately after striking for 5 minutes only, then wind Nos. 2 & 3, then, finish winding No. 1 immediately after striking again."

Running towards remission



When I was diagnosed with stage three breast cancer in 2014, I thought that my life was over. I was consumed with grief, rage, despair and fear. Little did I know that five years later I would be cancer-free and training for the London Marathon.

Don't get me wrong, this journey hasn't been easy; I've had six operations, 40 rounds of radiotherapy, bone-strengthening infusions and six months of chemotherapy.

However, one of the most important things that I've learned is that you don't fight this fight alone. My mum and dad (Katherine and Philip de Louvois) have rallied support across Winkleigh to raise money for Breast Cancer Now, who work tirelessly to develop treatments which aim to stop breast cancer in its tracks. I was just 36 when I was diagnosed and it took three months before the doctors took me seriously, nobody should have to deal with that.



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ľd enjoved alwavs cvcling struggled to get out on the bike during my treatment. As the chemo became easier, I started easing into running and quickly developed a passion for it. It's instantly accessible, you don't need a lot of kit and you can do it at your own pace. Throughout the five vears of my treatment, I started thinking about the marathon. Initially, people said I was nuts but that just spurred me on. When I contacted Breast Cancer Now and asked for a

place I was overjoyed to be offered a spot and can't wait for April 26th!


- Project Gateway (South Africa) £300.00



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Our Devon County Councillor Writes



As we head into Spring there is a lot to report back on from the County Council in this edition. Since Christmas the main work of the Council has been preparing and setting the new Budget for the forthcoming financial year. At the time of writing the Budget is still subject to approval at Full Council although I am not anticipating any major changes.

Following the General Election the Council's financial settlement from central government was in line with expectations and it will not be a harsh budget. The overall revenue budget will increase

from £498 million to £541 million. Of the three principal services, Adult Care and Health sees a £23.7m increase (10%), Children's Services £11.5m (8.5%) and Highways £2.8m (5%) increase. An extra £1 million will also go into the Highways Drainage Budget. There is also positive news for Devon's schools with the next financial year seeing an increase in Schools Funding of £47.7m, with a total gross budget for school funding of £603 million. This funding is explicitly ring-fenced for schools and is managed by them. It does not form part of DCC's overall budget.

With the County Council increasing its budget this will mean that DCC's share of the council tax precept will increase by 3.99%, with 2% allocated specifically for Adult Social Care. I know that council tax increases are not welcomed but with a growing demand on our services and with an ageing population spending on social services is only likely to increase over the next few years rather than decrease. Small and moderate increases in the precept will help to fund these demands on our services.

I do appreciate though that people can sometimes feel that their council tax increases, but the quality of service does not! What I do say though is that I do fight hard to ensure our part of Devon gets its fair share and I will continue to do so.

More locally the condition of our highway network in Winkleigh continues to be a favourite subject in my email inbox! I know that there have been some bad potholes on Barnstaple Street and Eggesford Road and that the condition of Coopers Hill is poor, however **please continue to report potholes and other highway defects**. I was disappointed to hear at a recent meeting that people were giving up reporting potholes "because nothing happens". I know it is frustrating when a pothole is not repaired, however if no one reports anything then do not expect <u>anything</u> off the main road network to be repaired because minor roads are only inspected by Pothole Inspectors once a year.

You can report potholes and other highways defects by simply typing devon.cc/report-it onto your web browser or by phoning **0345 155 1004**. There is also a new feature on the website where once a pothole is inspected, if it is logged

for repair a 'roadworks' sign will appear on the online map with an estimated time of repair.

Secondly, every time a pothole repair or an unblocked drain is logged, the stats all go back to County Hall and form part of the data to carry out future works. So the more potholes are reported the more likely the road will be resurfaced or patched in the future. Ditto for drainage schemes with blocked drain reports.

Finally, as part of the Highways pilot project in Torrington Rural, I know that Coopers Hill and Eggesford Road were highlighted as key priorities for future works in the Parish so I am hopeful some more substantial repairs will take place in the upcoming financial year.

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From our Torridge District Councillor



As our latest wet winter drags on I hope you are enjoying the sound waves without the continual mention of Brexit or a General Election — we all deserve a rest after that trauma! Torridge District Council appointed a new leader last autumn, Cllr Ken James (Independent), a farmer representing Milton & Tamarside Ward. Under his guidance the Council is working to develop its next strategic plan covering the next few years. Funding of local authorities continues to be a challenge and

we are all focussed on making sure every part of our budget is used to the best possible effect. I sit on both the external and internal Oversight & Scrutiny Committees at TDC where we spend much time examining the output and value of our service suppliers as well as our own officers. All our meetings are open to the public and I encourage people to take an interest!

Just before Christmas I had the pleasure of visiting **Winkleigh Primary School** – a real hive of activity and learning guided by fantastic teachers and support staff. However they have places that need filling and future demographics for the area mean the challenge will increase further so we all need to encourage people living in the parish to use our excellent local school – and minimise their carbon footprint by reducing the distance they drive their children to school each day.

I am pleased to have been able to secure some grant funding to help with the production of The Winkleigh Society's new Information Directory and also (together with Andrew Saywell) the refurbishment of the Village Hall.

For those of you like me who rely on a septic tank rather than mains drainage the regulations changed on 1^{st} January 2020 meaning that you may have to switch to a new system (especially if you live near a watercourse). Don't get caught out – the new regulations can be easily accessed online.

Lastly, I have taken over as chair of the Torrington Area Advisory Group — a forum where neighbouring parishes can raise issues of common interest as well as receive updates from external organisations such as Devon CC, our Police & Crime Commissioner, etc. We meet 2-3 times a year and two parish councillors from Winkleigh (along with Torrington and every other parish in the area) will be able to vote when there is a need. Again I encourage you to take an interest — either through the Parish Council or come along to a meeting.

Catkin Blooms Flower shop, Castle Street, Winkleigh

Many readers will already have discovered this latest enterprise to grace our Village Centre. Cath Kenny has moved her ever-expanding business from her outdoor Garden Workshop at home (which it has now outgrown!) to what used to be the Fish Shop, just around the corner from the Post Office. This is a wonderful use of the recently redecorated building, which had lain vacant for a few years, bringing new life, vitality and hopefully more shoppers to the centre of the village. From a Community point of view, this has many advantages for increasing quality local shopping and is undoubtedly important these days in terms of supporting the local economy and reducing Carbon Footprint.

This is now Cath's 7th Year in this business and with encouragement from her Flower Club members and the fact that her youngest daughter has now started secondary school, Cath feels the time is right to expand into the shop with more space to develop and to run workshops. As I arrived to discuss points for this article one sunny January day, she was just taking delivery of her new Signs from Sarah J. Harvey, beautifully created in the shop's signature colours of grey and gold.

The preview Launch was held for Flower Club Members on 8th November, and the shop officially opened doors on 11th November 2019, coinciding with the lead up to Christmas, which was extremely busy!



The Ethos behind Catkin Blooms is that of a Green Florist: environmentally friendly with local produce using a researched network of local growers to provide flowers. Cath held up her yellow Rubbish bin to show me, her aim is that her rubbish will end up being just green! As we talked she was taking tulips out of cellophane wrapping, which she was then smoothing out to return to the Tulip

supplier from Cornwall. She has used redwood from Bondleigh to create her counter top on painted pallets, has two recycled Butler sinks in place and a series of upgraded cupboards and shelving using recycled wood from Winkleigh Timber Ltd.

Cath uses seasonal flowers and foliage grown mostly in the Southwest. Sometimes she needs to diversify a little further afield for weddings, but her main ethos is to steer people towards the concept of locally produced, seasonal English Country Garden British flowers, in local venues, each unique, with individual little touches.

From Catkin Blooms Website: "It's the little things that matter and those little moments you remember, that's what Catkin Blooms is all about..."



Equally for Funerals, Cath works with W.D. and S.J. Carne, making very personal bespoke arrangements to suit the person/family. She can provide for Green Burials using hazel frames and foam free displays which are therefore fully biodegradable.

Catkin Blooms regularly supplies local businesses, such as the King's Arms (see flowers on the bar and on tables) and local Holiday Cottages have her deliver Welcome Flowers for their guests.

Flower Club: Catkin Blooms runs a Flower Club to showcase seasonal blooms. Members pay £10 fortnightly for an 18 cm

vase which is refilled every 2 weeks on a Friday with a beautiful fresh seasonal posy. Subscriptions can be given as a present, Direct Debit or Standing Order is available, and if not needing flowers every 2 weeks, for example away on Holiday, the posy refill can be carried over to the following fortnight. Please pop in and talk to Cath if you wish to know more about the Flower Club.

Locally made Gifts, Arts and Crafts: Cath's shop is so much more than just a Florists! Cath displays artworks in her shop and supplies gifts and pottery from local artists, cards, hand-made notebooks, botanical candles, jewellery and has an environmentally-friendly cabinet with tastefully packaged, locally produced items such as beeswax wraps, soaps and shampoo bars, compostable cleaning cloths, bamboo toothbrushes, hemp wipes and make up remover pads, wooden brushes, pot brushes and shopping bags.

She also supplies Easter Spring Flower bulb planters, potted plants and plants which detoxify and oxygenate at night, all of which make superb and unusual gifts. In addition, Cath delivers flowers locally and supplies a variety of bouquet orders for



many occasions. By ordering from a florist direct, rather than through an online company, you get so much more for your money, because you are not having to include the online companies' commission. This keeps the economy local and thus supports the local community.

Workshops: Upstairs in the shop is used as a creative space for

arrangements and floral designs, but it will also be used for Workshops. There will be a calendar of events in addition to floristry workshops, Cath has plans for workshop ideas to include Basket Making, Easter Wreaths (many customers were delighted with their Christmas Wreaths and Cath's previously run Christmas Wreath making workshops are renowned) Beeswax Wraps, Soap Making, preparations for Mother's Day and possibly an afternoon tea featuring Edible Flowers! Pre booking in advance for any workshops will be essential as spaces fill up fast.

News from School

After an extremely busy Christmas term, everyone came back into school refreshed and ready to tackle the spring term.

The Nursery Unit have been engaged in a 'fantasy and legends' theme where castles have featured prominently. Different parts of a castle have been looked at including the drawbridge, moat, weapons and dungeon and the role-play area is currently being transformed to reflect this. The dragons in many of our fantasy stories link well with Chinese New Year which will be looked at too. Outdoor education is being reintroduced on Tuesday and Friday afternoons, when the children will take part in planned activities outdoors. One of the urgent jobs is to revamp and re-naturalise the garden, trying to get rid of as much of the plastic as possible!

The Owls in reception have a busy term planned too, looking at first and Traditional Tales and then moving on to Mini-beasts and the garden, just in time for the arrival of spring. Through their topic the children will be looking at building up their vocabulary through listening to the stories told in different ways and also through their own personal experiences. Numbers will be represented in lots of different ways and the children will search for 2D and 3D shapes in the stories and in the environment.



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The role play area will feature prominently this term, where the children will recreate the stories they have heard and use construction materials to build castles and bridges from the stories.

Castles feature again in the topic being looked at in Year 1 this term with the children visiting Castle Drogo on a trip in March. The Three Billy Goats Gruff will be used as a basis for the children to learn about writing their own imaginary stories before they move on to enjoy the legend, George and the Dragon. Telling the time is an important skill being looked at in maths, along with more basic necessities such as addition and subtraction, place value, measures and multiplication. An event beyond the children's living memory, linking well with the topic, will be the coronation of Queen Elizabeth II and this will be part of the humanities work along with locating and identifying characteristics of the four countries of the British Isles and their capital cities.

'Where we live' is the topic in the Year 2 class for this term and the children will be developing a variety of skills through this including compass and map skills while also looking at features of the local environment. This links with the work continuing in the second part of the term, when the children will be undertaking a survey of the local wildlife. Mixed-up fairy tales, poetry and 'The Gruffalo' provide a base for learning in literacy and multiplication, division, money, fractions and shape will be keeping everyone busy in maths. PE in Year 2 will be covering skills in tennis including

racket work and later, how to use gym equipment competently and safely.

Communication is a very important part of how well we can live our lives and the Year 3 children will be focusing on this in their PHSE (personal, social, and health education) work, learning how to respect each other's opinions. Linking to this will be work in RE, looking at the religions of Islam and Judaism. Literacy will be using a variety of texts to explore and expand vocabulary, look at complex sentence structures and ways to bring writing to life. The maths curriculum in Year 3 is indeed very busy with multiplication, money, statistics, length, perimeter and fractions on the agenda.

'Natural resources' cover the learning across the whole spring term in Year 4 with the distribution of energy, food,



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minerals and water across the world and the issues of imports and exports being studied. The science topic - electricity, links well with this, as does art, when the children will be developing their knowledge of landscape paintings of the environment and in DT when they will be designing and making their own biscuits. Descriptive writing, planning and writing independently as well as structural and grammatical elements of the story 'Blue John' are part of literacy work this term. Maths includes multiplication and division while decimals are introduced, building on prior work on place value.

Starring in a wildlife documentary is on the cards for Year 5 children this term! After looking at the life cycle of birds the children will write and perform their own documentary contrasting and comparing different living things. This is part of the science curriculum which begins in this class with a look at reproduction and life cycles in a variety of different types of animals and plants. Jane Goodall and the nowendangered chimpanzees in Africa will be studied to supplement this. Rivers have proved to be extremely important over time and this aspect will be looked at in geography as well as how rivers change, with the children exploring the life cycle of rivers. During the term the children will go on a residential trip to Skern Lodge, where their PHSE work on 'Going for Goals' may prove valuable!

The term begins in Year 6 with the topic, 'The Amazing Americas', linking History, Geography, Art and DT. Through this topic the children will experience being 'president' of a state of America, considering what is happening there and looking at the human and physical geography of their region. A trip in March to the Mayflower Museum, celebrating this year the 400th anniversary of the voyage, and to Plymouth Theatre Royal to see a performance of 'Holes' by Louis Sachar has been arranged to complement this topic. The Harry Potter books by JK Rowling will provide the basis for literacy work with the children identifying different forms of flashback and their functions. Knowledge of the different functions of fractions, decimals and percentages and their relationship will be looked at in maths with children converting between them to solve problems in different contexts.

This term is turning into an exciting time for sport at Winkleigh, with the Daily Mile running track being put to such good use by children and parents. The goal of running enough miles to reach Tokyo in time for the Olympics is on track, the mileage total currently reaching Poland! There are lots of events, trips and guests being planned to celebrate Sport Relief week in March, all possible through the PE Premium Funding Grant.

The new 'for the love of Reading' initiative, when parents and carers are invited into school to share stories and books with the children on Friday mornings from 8.45 am to 9.05 am, is proving very popular and is a lovely way to end each productive and enjoyable week at the school.

Winkleigh Parish Council News

New Member and Vacancies: The Parish Council welcomes Andy Hipkiss who was co-opted onto the Parish Council in January, bringing the number of Cllrs to 8 with 3 vacancies. Ivan Sanders was co-opted in November 2019 and after attending 1 meeting, resigned in February 2020.

Budget and Precept 2020-21: The Council approved the 2020-21 budget of £36,316.00 and set the precept as £28,636.00, equating to an annual Band D household rate of £45.09, which is an increase of £1.24 (2.3%) (10p per month).

The budget pays for the overall management costs for the Council, which includes staff, administration, professional fees, IT and Data Protection compliance and full running costs for the Parish Cemetery. The budget also includes grant applications payable in the next financial year totalling £1,245.00. During 2020 the Parish Council are legally required to upgrade their website in accordance with Accessibility Regulations at considerable cost, as well as the Cemetery Bungalow requiring electrical work and contingency accrual towards boiler replacement.

Neighbourhood Plan: The Winkleigh Parish Neighbourhood Plan was submitted to Torridge District Council on 3rd February 2020 for independent examination. This is likely to take until mid-Spring, following which, there may be amendments to the Plan before it is approved and the Parish of Winkleigh will then hold a referendum on the final document.

Clerk Qualification: The Parish Clerk, Melanie Bickell, successfully obtained the Certificate in Council Clerk Administration (CiLCA) qualification during 2019, which increases the competency and powers of the parish council when the council meets the requirements of two-thirds members elected.

VE/VJ Day 75th Anniversary: The Parish Council are seeking your views on whether the Parish should hold their own events to mark the 75th Anniversary of VE Day over the weekend commencing 8th May. The council have set aside a budget to mark the occasion but need to know if this is something the parishioners would like to see and what events would you be interested in.

Climate Emergency: Winkleigh Parish Council declared a Climate Emergency in 2019 and are actively and financially supporting the newly formed Winkleigh Climate Emergency Group.

New Gateway Signage: The Council are liaising with Highways with regards to replacing the current gateway signs into the Parish.

Winkleigh Airfield Liaison Protocol: The Parish Council would like to involve businesses based on the Airfield more closely with the Parish and will be writing to

all businesses inviting them to form a liaison group which can be attended by Cllrs and members of the public.

Parish Council Table at Monthly Market Village Hall: The council will be jointly hosting a table with the Climate Emergency Group at all monthly markets to give you the opportunity to meet councillors and speak with them if you have any concerns or would like to raise any issues.

What's happening in Winkleigh Environment Group?

In the last edition of Distinctly Winkleigh, we introduced the newly-formed Winkleigh Environment Group (WEG), set up in October to try to help us reduce our carbon footprint. This time we are updating you on what the group has been doing since last October. At the last count, our group had doubled since our first meeting, with more than 40 people now on our distribution list. At our recent meeting we had a representative from Wembworthy Village Hall, and a teacher from Winkleigh Primary School join us for the first time.

We intend to publish articles in all future editions of DW to keep people informed and to open up a dialogue for information and advice sharing. We can support your journey to reduce waste and help you save money along the way. If you can think of waste as a resource for creative reuse, it may help to reduce consumption.

In January we showed a film about what can and is being done globally by grass roots communities to change behaviours and reduce consumption. Despite a few technical difficulties, it was very well-received. About 60 people filled the Village Hall on a cold, dark January night, so we were very pleased with the turn-out. At least 20 people have joined WEG since then and asked to be on our email list.

Actions agreed at the last group meeting included the following:

- To post information on https://winkleighonline.com as often as possible and work towards having information and advice for all the categories on the Environment Group section.
- To set up our own Facebook page, but in the meantime, share information to the existing Winkleigh Village page.
- To man two tables at the monthly Winkleigh Market, one with the support of the Parish Council, where we will promote a variety of subjects. In February, the first table featured composting and wormeries, manned expertly by James Kendrew, together with some information about Plastic Free Communities. If this proves a popular concept, in time Winkleigh could become a Plastic Free Community. The stall was laden with handmade bird boxes, swift nests,



dormouse and bat boxes, - all made from recycled materials, or offcuts of timber. Some were in flat packs ready to be assembled at home – hopefully simpler than some well-known furniture outlets! James also showed a simply-constructed bee hive. We did very well with sales of the bird boxes, kindly made and



donated to the group by Simon and Sonia Hodgson. These will be for sale all year and Simon can advise where and when to site them.

• On the second stall we had samples of natural cleaning products for sale, plus the raw ingredients, which provide cheap, chemical-free, non-polluting cleaning solutions: all in recycled containers! The products have "recipes" printed on them so you can make them at home. We also had some ideas for

reusing textiles, as throw away clothes / fabric in landfill is a huge problem, leaching chemicals into the soils and water-table.

- Eco Bricks are another wonderful way of locking up harmful plastics that cannot be recycled, such as Clingfilm, clean plastic food wrapping, crisp packets, etc. They can all be packed into empty plastic bottles for reuse in the construction and gardening industry. We are looking for the nearest hub to collect the bottles, but if sufficient bricks can be made, maybe a group in Winkleigh could do this?
- In due course we will list items for recycling that you can bring to the market, for us to collect on your behalf and to send to the nearest reuse centre. This is work in progress while we find the most efficient way of proceeding. One of our members will be at the weekly Wednesday Mini-Market in the Community Centre to advise what can be collected and recycled and collect the items.



- On February 15th, we held an event in the Community Centre to discuss starting up a Repair Café in Winkleigh see https://winkleighonline.com and the summer edition of DW to find out more.
- A Litter Pick is being organised (see noticeboards, etc. for details); if you are
 interested in regular litter picks, please get in touch. The Bio-diversity group also
 had about 200 trees for planting in January to March, mostly on land behind the
 Sports Centre (see article on page 53). In addition 10 bird boxes have been
 donated and put up in the cemetery grounds.
- We plan to organise workshops and talks about various eco topics, for example, reusing textiles, making cleaning materials, and composting. We are thinking about the feasibility of establishing a site for a community compost scheme for use by people who do not have space to do so. We would appreciate feedback from you on all these topics and any other ideas you may have.

Finally for those concerned about Palm Oil in our food and beauty products, check out the Chester Zoo website (www.chesterzoo.org/whatyoucando) who have a 'product shopping list' of items that contain sustainable palm oil, to save time looking at labels in the supermarket! They make a good argument for using sustainable palm oil instead of boycotting the products containing it altogether.

THERETS LINGUISTS NO PLANT BOOK SAFLY HEAST BLODS

DWT Culm Grassland Natural Flood Management

This four year project across Northern Devon is helping us to understand, communicate and increase the flood risk and wildlife benefits that Culm grasslands bring to northern Devon's communities. The Culm Grassland Natural Flood Management Project is led by Devon Wildlife Trust (DWT), supported and funded by the Environment Agency (EA), Devon County Council (DCC) and the European Union through the Interreg 2 Seas Triple C project. Delivery is supported by a partnership of EA, DCC, University of Exeter and Natural England. The project started in October 2016 and runs to December 2020.

Project Update Winter 2019-2020: Over the winter staff and volunteers have worked with landowners and commoners across Northern Devon to help manage encroaching scrub on several beautiful Culm grassland sites. Management aims to maintain mosaics of valuable habitats by preventing willow, birch and bramble invading the species-rich grassland. On sites where grazing is not practicable, or where grazing levels are very low, scrub control is a key management technique. The work is carried out during winter months to minimize disturbance to wildlife, especially nesting birds and small mammals.



Alongside the practical works, we continued have to visit landowners in order to advise on management of Culm grassland and other habitats, and to find suitable sites for grassland habitat creation the over summer of 2020.

Anyone visiting a Culm grassland site recently will probably have noticed the large quantities of water being held on the surface. The surface roughness of these

grasslands is one important factor influencing their ability to mitigate flooding. Quite how important is one of the questions that our PhD student, Nicola Ellis, has been trying to answer. In the meantime, these wet areas provide plenty of space for frogs to spawn!

Looking ahead: We have three Culm grassland management workshops lined up for the spring and summer, focused on grassland management for pollinators (especially bumblebees), scrub management and what to look for, and using Culm grassland as a green hay source.

We expect to be busy this summer assisting landowners with Countryside Stewardship (CS) applications. The application window has just opened for

agreements commencing January 2021, offering opportunities for landowners to be paid for environmental work. CS agreements will continue to be offered in 2021, 2022, and 2023. After this, the new Environmental Land Management (ELM) schemes will replace CS in 2024. Defra have said applying for CS now will put you in the best position to join ELM, as well as securing you a long-term viable income as BPS payments are reduced. If you are successful in your application to ELM, you will be able to end your CS agreement, without penalty, at the end of an agreement year to then start the new ELM scheme.

Flogas Supply Interruption - An Apology

On Sunday 26th January, residents of the Westcots Estate awoke to cold houses as the bulk tank supplying their gas was more or less empty. The supplier, Flogas, was deluged with phone calls and immediately dispatched a tanker to replenish the tank, as well as a technician to check that the supply was restored to the gas appliances in each property, where someone was in.

As one of the Flogas customer representatives on the estate, I had a telephone meeting with their Consumer Sales and Distribution Managers on the Monday. They apologised profusely for the supply interruption which they are treating very seriously. Everyone affected should now have received a letter of apology.

As stated in the letter, they explained to me they were changing the way the telemetry data from the 12 individual tanks that constitute the bulk tank is used to indicate when a gas delivery is needed; thus reducing the risk of future interruptions.

If you have any problems, such as loss of supply, individual gas deliveries, billing, or any other matter that you cannot get resolved by the normal channels of contact with Flogas, please let us know. Also do check your gas bills to make sure you are being charged the correct rates of 38.5p per litre and 13.7p per day standing charge, fixed until 31st December 2020.

Horry Mill in Hollocombe is an official rainfall recording station for the Environment Agency and the table summarises the rainfall for 2019. The Environment Agency is always looking for volunteers to record rainfall. It is quite a commitment, as they require readings to be taken every day at a set time. They provide the gauge and select the precise location, which is quite important. Currently the data is written onto special cards which are supplied each year and posted to their location in Exeter, although there are plans to move to an online system in the future to reduce costs.

Although we do not keep official records of temperature, we live in a frost pocket and on 20th January 2020 we recorded minus 9 degrees, and on the 21st minus 6 degrees, a bit chilly!

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What do Archaeology clubs do in the winter?

Well, some dig of course, and ACE has done that in the past but to be honest digging mud in sideways hail palls after a while. We tried walks of archaeological interest but kept having to cancel them due to the weather. Therefore, this year we decided to stay indoors and get on with identifying and cataloguing finds.

We started digging at Moistown near Winkleigh in 2013 and since then we have amassed over 3000 finds, mostly pottery but some metal finds, environmental finds, bones, shells and the like but also plastic and other modern materials. When each find is excavated its co-ordinates are recorded and it is given a finds number, and these are recorded on the plastic bag that we keep the find in. Once we start the post excavation work the find number is written on the find, where possible. Difficult when it is a bit of baler twine and that is why we keep the finds together with the plastic bags they are in, at all times.

All the information also goes onto a spreadsheet; some of this is done on site. In the winter session we fill in the rest of the spreadsheet. Each find is identified, weighed, measured and dated and all this data is entered on the spreadsheet. We have been learning as we go along, especially in terms of the pottery, of which we have the biggest number of finds. Eventually, when we have managed to raise some funds, we will have an expert to look at the more interesting pieces but, in the meantime, we are learning to separate the industrial pottery from the medieval and so on. We



have our own in-house expert on bones looking at the environmental finds. We have a few bones but there is no need to get too excited as they are animal bones.

The photo on the left shows two finds bags with possibly medieval pottery, all duly numbered.

The oldest piece of pottery we have found so far, has been identified as Saxo-Norman, so around 1066.

We seem to have quite a bit of medieval pottery. Industrial pottery is plentiful and



to some, not very interesting. Think of the blue and white ware that you dig up in your gardens, but in some cases, we intend to put pieces together and rebuild the original plate or cup or.....chamber pot!!

If you don't think excavation work is for you, perhaps doing this sort of post-excavation work might interest you? If so, do get in touch.
