spoke about the stresses and strains the farming community is under, the toll it has on mental health and how they operate a listening, supportive service for farmers. Colin took questions from the floor prompting a lively debate and he stayed talking informally afterwards. I often wonder if those who amended them in 1952 could possibly have ever imagined that we would still be praying for Elizabeth our Queen 70 years later. Her Majesty has had a long reign during a time which has seen huge changes in the world and society. Human beings have landed on the moon, we know a huge amount about DNA and our genes, technology has become essential in our lives and we can communicate instantly with people on the other side of the world. Wars have raged, political turmoil has occurred, Prime Ministers have come and gone and the Royal Family itself has experienced many dramas.

Yet the Queen has remained solid and steadfast in her service of the nation and in bearing witness to her Christian faith. In the book 'The Servant Queen and the King she serves' which was published for her 90th Birthday, she writes in the forward 'I have been - and remain - very grateful to you for your prayers and to God for his steadfast love. I have indeed seen his faithfulness.' This knowledge of God's faithfulness is lived out in her life and in a very public way. Her Christmas broadcasts to the nation often bear witness to her faith as she speaks of the real meaning of Christmas and of her personal faith in Christ. The Queen's long reign is an example to us all not just of living a life of faith but also as an example of service to and on behalf of others. Service which she has undertaken joyfully, unstintingly, and generously. As we gather together in our communities to celebrate her long reign we give thanks for her life, her service and her faith. We give thanks too for all who serve our communities faithfully and especially those who have organised our Platinum Jubilee celebrations. Inspired by the Queen's example may we commit ourselves to the service of others and our nation.

Coronation Day 1953

In 1953 I was a student at a Church of England Teacher Training College in London and on 2nd June we all had the day off for the Queen's Coronation. Some of our fellow students went home to watch the ceremony on television. (The TVs in those days had very small screens and only a minority of the populace had one.)

However, quite a few of us decided to go up to town to watch the procession. My friend Molly and I took ourselves off to a spot in the Mall, by the Duke of York steps which lead into Pall Mall, and we were early enough to claim ourselves a place by the kerb. We had taken sandwiches, fruit and a drink to sustain us overnight and, of course, our 'macs' to sit on and in case we had rain!

By the time darkness fell there were quite a number of people joining us. We took it in turns to doze, but we were rudely awakened by the police requesting us to stand up so that people could move in behind us – this at 2.00 am! A couple of Kings College students near us suggested that the four of us took it in turns to sit and stand, two at a time, but at 6.00 am we all had to stand, gathering our bags around us, as the crowd was closing in behind us.

Soldiers from the Guards Brigade now marched along the Mall to get into positions lining the Mall. By the time they had performed their 'right dressing' and were in place we realised that we could see quite clearly between each soldier. Also at that time we learned that Edmund Hillary and Tensing Norgay, part of a British team had successfully made the first ascent of Mount Everest in Nepal.



At 9.00 am there was movement on the road: the start of the procession, first minor dignitaries in cars, then colonial rulers in carriages. Among them was Queen Salote of Tonga in a open carriage, despite the steady drizzle of rain, waving at us and smiling. Queen Salote was a tall, large lady and was not to be forgotten. A number of processions then followed one after the other, either in cars or carriages until, finally the Queen's procession came by: Her Majesty and Prince Philip in the Golden Coach on their way to Westminster Abbey. They arrived at the Abbey at precisely 11.00 am.

All along the route a Tannoy system had been set up so we were all able to listen to the Coronation Service. Molly and I listened to the service but we decided we were too tired to stand and wait for the return procession so, once the National Anthem indicated the end of the service, we made our way up back to college, hot baths and bed. Years later Molly bought me a copy of "The Coronation of Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth" (approved souvenir programme) - price 2/6d (12.5 pence). It is very interesting as it details all the people who attended the Coronation and the precise timings of the departure of all the guests from Buckingham Palace.

What a day – and what stamina the Queen had and indeed has to this day.

Down Farm News

After writing in the last issue of Distinctly Winkleigh about our new growers cooperative here at Down Farm we have had an eventful and turbulent start to the 2022 growing season. We all know Winkleigh is a windy village and the strength of winds during Storm Eunice was felt here in our market garden. By about 10.30 am the wind got inside one of our tunnels lifted it off the ground and bent it out of shape. We had to make the split-second decision to cut the plastic sheet off to stop the whole frame and concrete from being lifted and launched into our other polytunnels and worse our house and electricity pylons. We thought we would be able to take it down over the weekend, but the wind kept coming so we had to leave the polytunnel flapping about in the wind for at least a week after it was damaged in the storms. You may have seen it from the A3124!

To add to the loss of a tunnel, two days later we took a team outing to South Devon and on the journey were in a serious car accident on the A38 leaving me (Liv) with a brain injury and a broken shoulder, Henry and Josh suffered from whiplash. Chloe was luckily out of the car, and my one-year-old son was safe in his car seat. We then had to navigate the beginning of our new cooperative business venture with an injured team and one tunnel down. The rest of the team also had to support me with childcare as I couldn't look after my son on my own or drive anywhere with injuries, which is tricky in our rural location.

In our time of need we launched a crowdfunder to help us buy a new tunnel. We reached our £4,000 target in 24 hours and stretched the target to £8,000. We raised a total of £10,000 which blew us away. Our community stepped up when we needed them most and the money has helped us to buy a new polytunnel from local company Ferryman, cover the necessary installation costs and employ extra staff to cover me whilst I recovered from my injuries.



I am writing this 10 weeks from Storm Eunice and we have just put the new skin our replacement polytunnel. the week before our tomatoes and aubergines need to planted in it. What Timing!! Although it has been a rocky start to 2022 we are going into the new growing season with a new tunnel that is stronger and more robust than before. Whilst it was not the start to our new venture we were expecting, we are ready for another growing season here in Winkleigh and looking forward to what is to come!

Buying our produce:

- You can subscribe to a regular veg box (£12/£16 small/large) from Feb December or buy produce from our online shop (www.down-farm.com). All
 our produce is organic from our farm or sourced from other local suppliers
 when we run short.
- We sell flower bunches grown on our farm June September. You can subscribe to a regular bunch for £12/week/fortnight collected or delivered.
- We have a stall at Crediton and Exeter Farmers Market on the first and third Saturdays or every Thursday.

Summer events: We have a barn in our market garden which we have been making into a community space allowing us to run an events programme this year (see DW Diary for events and dates). Tickets for events will be available online or via email.

Also look out for a Singing Weekend and Yoga Retreat run by other organisations. If you would like to use our Community Barn for your event, please get in touch to come and have a look. We have kitchen facilities, garden space and space for overnight stays.

Pre-arranged and Bespoke Funeral Plans Available Across the County however, one of the main pieces of work currently being done by the County Council has been on supporting Ukrainian refugees arriving into the County. Can I thank everyone in Winkleigh and across Devon for your amazing support and generosity towards the people of Ukraine. Already the first families are arriving here in Torrington Rural and I know that here they will be well looked after.

For anyone still looking to sponsor and/or accommodate Ukrainian refugees, DCC have updated their website to include all the latest information and support needed. Please visit - https://www.devon.gov.uk/supporting-ukraine/

The County Council have, alongside 'Team Devon' colleagues and partners, been working hard contacting several hundred potential sponsors to conduct and complete the required DBS checks.

In addition, working with District Councils across Devon, we have developed and implemented a property and people appraisal process. District Councils have started to check a range of sponsor properties using this process and thanks to standardising it across the County it has meant that this was able to be sped up quickly. The County Council is also working with partners to ensure we can make early payments to sponsors and guests and alongside this, we are developing clear processes and arrangements regarding school admissions, health registration and access to Universal Credit and other benefit entitlements.

Due to the multiple organisations involved I know that some people have had difficulty in contacting the relevant Council and/or Department, but these issues should now be resolved. However, if you have any questions or issues on this matter there is now a dedicated email address to use which is health.ukraineresettlement-mailbox@devon.gov.uk. Alternatively, please feel free to contact me directly.

The other main issue DCC is working on is supporting residents with the cost-ofliving crisis. While the threat of Covid may have receded, we are still dealing with the economic consequences of the pandemic and with the return of inflation, the cost-of-living crisis is a huge concern for local people.

While the County Council cannot provide all the solutions; as part of the Government's Household Support Fund initiative, DCC has been awarded £5 million of Government funding to help residents who are struggling to afford to pay for their energy or water bills or buy food and other essential items.

The first tranche of funding will be used to help support Devon residents who have prepayment or 'pay-as-you-go' meters to help pay rising energy bills. This will be targeted specifically at families with children and people of pensionable age who are struggling financially.

The County Council are working with the eight District Councils in Devon, including Torridge District Council, to develop schemes that will make the funding available for residents.

Alongside this, DCC will continue to make free school meal holiday vouchers available for May half-term and summer holidays, to ensure children and young people who are eligible for benefit-related free school meals do not go hungry over the holidays.

At the time of writing (11th May), work is still going on to finalise these initiatives, but I expect details to be available online on *www.devon.gov.uk* as soon as possible.

Nonetheless, while these are difficult and challenging times, I and the County Council remain committed to supporting our residents during this tough period. Hopefully the summer months will bring happier news.

May I take this opportunity to thank all my volunteers for their support and help with this service. If you are interested in helping out, please give me a ring!



From our Torridge District Councillor



What unique and challenging times lie ahead: with the cost of living and fuel crisis, the aftershocks and potential re-emergence of the COVID pandemic and now the war in Ukraine that threatens to spill out across Europe.

What is especially unnerving is that neither we nor our Government can have much influence over the future direction of these phenomena – ones that are clearly going to shape the way we live our lives in the near term.

So in the words of Baden-Powell, we must "be prepared" in a way that we have not experienced in recent decades.

The pandemic taught (or reminded) us that the State cannot immediately fix everything and so sometimes it falls to local communities and charities to provide the safety net to support the vulnerable – a role done so well during the pandemic by Parish emergency groups, etc. However, I fear that what lies ahead will be greater and so the response needed will have to be more comprehensive.

Therefore I urge our Parish Councils, local emergency committees, voluntary groups, local charities, etc. to look **now** at the detail of what might be needed in the future and how it could be provided.

There is never any substitute for good forward planning and rehearsal. Sitting with our heads in the sand thinking that someone else will swoop in and do something is just not realistic!








The Easter Bunny also dropped off chocolate treats in our Hut for the children of Hollocombe. Thank you Bel.

Out of the Darkness and into the Light

Following the Obituary to Janet Magor on page 34 of DW 81, Distinctly Winkleigh has had a further conversation with her husband Adrian, who has kindly offered his experience of grief and coping with loss. Everybody grieves differently, he says, but there are many stages we go through and some common denominators which can be helpful when it comes to ways of dealing with it.

Thirty years of policing in the Metropolitan Police Force provided Adrian with a range of experiences of loss for many of those with whom he came into contact, both public and colleagues. Towards the end of his time in the police force he was in charge as a Temporary Inspector, covering a colleague who was off sick. "It was a very full year" explained Adrian after a long pause and a little shake of his head. A year or so after he retired and the family had already moved to Shaftesbury, Adrian was invited to take a course which he thoroughly enjoyed and was ordained into the Free Church as a priest. He was at that time working weekdays in the same Waitrose as Janet, which left him free to follow his Church work at the weekends. He completed a three-year course studying Theology at Worcester Theological College: "That course was wonderful, I was so happy, everything kept falling into place, I really felt it" he says.

The Bishop of the Free Church for the South called him in at the end of the course to say "Adrian, you did well with that. We are going to ordain you and give you a church that needs help."

This was a Free Church in the North-West area of Exeter, built during the war. When



Adrian went there, the congregation was a total of six. Within nine months of ministry, organising Christmas dinners, outings and other activities the congregation had increased to thirty-two. In his ministry there, Adrian became more involved in helping others with loss. He took many funerals in his time in ministry. It was another new undertaking which he continued after completing another course (C of E) as a Lay Reader in Winkleigh.

However, any amount of experience cannot prepare you for the loss and pain when someone with whom you have spent 57 years together, had 3 children, someone with whom you shared all your hopes and fears and ways of working things out throughout the ups and downs of life, someone you have prayed with,

shared Communion with leaves you. Adrian has been in a "Very Dark Hole" but he made a decision to use Easter Sunday as a date to take the first steps to move forward out of it. He still wore a black garment, his black police blazer with the badges he's won for International Target Shooting during his time in the police force. However, beneath that he wore a white shirt, lighter trousers and bright red gloves. He made a conscious decision to bring colour back in. It was a symbolic shift.

Adrian is a man of Faith. When he spent the last time in hospital with Janet, he spoke softly to her about her going, her freedom from pain. He waited, then quietly spoke about the Lord coming to help her. If she needed to go, to leave with his blessing. Finally, his last words, barely whispered, "Janet, when you've been called home, please do one thing? Prepare a place for me to join you?" Janet was unable to respond but Adrian felt sure she heard him. She died the next morning.

The communication Adrian and Janet shared was a key to their marriage: "Communication with others is of vital importance, especially when you are feeling very dark, very low. Taking tiny steps, little goals, making changes to lift, bit by bit, out of the darkness into the light."

Adrian has said that if anyone wants to talk with him about similar issues, his door is always open.

Snippets from Local Newspapers

Peter Christie in the <u>North Devon Journal</u> [March 31] highlights the problem of empty homes in Bideford. In 2020 there were 161 [68 being 'long-term' empty]. A long-standing councillor on the housing committee, he floats the idea of Torridge reintroducing requisitioning of empty houses.

<u>The Okehampton Times</u> [April 7] enthuses about the popularity of the Okehampton to Exeter railway service. One Okehampton councillor, keen to highlight the reestablished train service as a destination for Dartmoor, has proposed commissioning a statue of a hiker by the station.

<u>The Crediton Country Courier</u> [April 7] flags up the screening at Crediton Arts Centre of the classic Ukrainian silent film 'Earth'. A 1930 cinematic masterpiece by **Dovzhenko** it is about the resistance of the Kulaks in the Ukraine to Stalin's collectivisation of their farmland. Nine days after its release it was banned by the Soviet authorities. The film was accompanied by a live improvised soundtrack by three local musicians. All donations went to the **DEC. Ukrainian Appeal.**

Western Morning News [April 22] features the economic crisis facing British egg farmers. In particular, free range egg producers, [BFREPA] say it will be unviable to stay in business unless supermarkets agree to increase their prices. A survey by BFREPA found that 51% are contemplating stopping production with 18% saying they will decide when their current flock has been dispatched.



In the Moorlander [1-14 April] Penny Mills the Director of Devon Campaign for the Protection of Rural England writes and warns about the Biodiversity Offsets scheme. Very few have heard about it but Developers most certainly have as they stand to gain from it. Offering to plant saplings in another parish to offset bio-diversity loss on a prime site means that legitimate objections to planning approval on environmental grounds can be overruled. Putting up bird or bat boxes will in no way mitigate the loss of ancient woodland and hedgerows. Ms Mills concludes by stating that CPRE will be briefing all Devon MPs on this vital issue.





Ashridge Court News

The Richards moved to Ashridge Court in 2012 taking on the challenge of a house in need of modernisation, decaying out-buildings and dilapidated barns. Over the last ten years they have lovingly restored the house, The Old Laundry (now a holiday let) and gardens to something of their former glory. Work on restoring the barn began in earnest in 2015 when their daughter's friends decided that it would make a fantastic venue for her wedding.

The vision for the barn has now grown into a full-time business with thirteen couples tying the knot and dancing the night away in 2021 alone. More discoveries in the Biodiversity Area

I always find it exciting to come across another new species in the Biodiversity Area. This Spring I found a tiny leaf beetle, shiny black with red legs and antennae, named *Chrysolina bankii*. I also saw a Willow Warbler there for the first time. But my most exciting find so far in 2022 was the nest of a young Harvest Mouse. The Latin name - *Micromys minutus* - gives us a clue to its size! Weighing just 6 grams as an adult, the Harvest Mouse is a tiny mammal only ever seen in cute photographs, posed on stems of wheat, with its tail gripping the stem.

It is possible to search for their abandoned nests among tussocky grass during the



winter. I was lucky enough to find one tucked inside a tree-protection spiral. The adult mouse weaves a maternity nest out of grass, supported within a large tussock of coarse grass, such as Cocksfoot. Here the babies are born and reared, and when grown to independence in a few weeks, they go off to weave their own solitary nests to sleep in.

They feed on insects, seeds and berries, which are supplied by our hedgerow trees. Most Harvest Mice do not survive the winter, with those that do starting to breed again in April-September. Thanks to Marie Reynolds for her watercolour illustration.



'twould go down well



Hunts Bakery

Herbert (Bert) and his son, Leon purchased the Bakery in South Street, Winkleigh in April 1948 from Mr Fred Letheren; included in the purchase was one full-time member of staff Miss Peggy Ford.

By 1959, with a larger bakery, they employed 26 full and part-time staff and it was decided to have a works outing. A coach was hired from Mr Ted Saunders and Mr John Beer was the driver. The first outing was to Polperro and Looe, and John Beer asked if his wife and 2 children could join future trips. Subsequently outings included Padstow, Bournemouth, Corfe Castle, Stourhead, Longleat and Beaulieu.



This picture is from the 1960 trip to Padstow and Newquay. John Beer can be just seen to the back of this picture, second rear right, behind Mrs Bette Beardon, and his wife: the lady in the cardigan standing on the far left with her daughter and son in front of her.

The 'works' outings only continued until 1967 but the bakery remained for many years until it was sold.

ACE Archaeology Club - Springing into Summer!!

Since I last wrote we have had three ACE days, two looking at things on Dartmoor and one to do with a church at South Tawton. The weather was kind to us on all of them, so we must be doing something right.

In March we set off to finish something we started a few years ago. We were helping out an ACE member with work on her parish churchyard at South Tawton. We had previously surveyed most of it but have now finished that off and also helped to decipher some of the older inscriptions on the gravestones. This will help visitors trying to do family research.

Our April ACE day was a trip to Mardon Down, near Moretonhampstead. We explored prehistoric cairns, saw stone rows and discussed local legends. The surprise of the day was that seemingly the whole of Mardon Down is riddled with World War 2 practice trenches. There was even evidence of bridging, railway cuttings and embankments which had been constructed by American engineers. The morning prehistory session was led by Andy Crabb, our Archaeology Adviser and also a Dartmoor National Park archaeologist. The afternoon WW2 session was led by our member Anne Whitbourn.

May's ACE Day was again on Dartmoor this time at Goadstone or Goatstone, depending on your preference.

The Goadstone area is very popular and accessible with the result that there is a fair amount of erosion happening around the prehistoric sites. We were comparing four previous surveys with what we could now see on the ground and working out what remedial work needs to be done to protect the sites. We plane-table surveyed two cairns and started an off-set survey of two stone rows but this wasn't finished so we will be going back there at some stage.

The rest of the summer will be taken up with preparation for our dig in July, 16th to the 31st. We hope to have an open day, probably on the 23rd so do look out for information about that on our website and our Facebook page, we really would like to see anyone who is interested. 
